

NY SWIMS AWARDS

Capital Region – \$28,467,344

City of Albany – (\$10 million) Lincoln Park Pool: The City of Albany is undergoing a complete rehabilitation of the Lincoln Park Pool. Built in 1930 and located in the South End of Albany in a distressed census tract, the project includes a zero-entry pool, a half Olympic style lap pool, splash pad and upgraded restrooms.

Albany County – (\$1,856,000) Cohoes Pool Facility: The County of Albany will be acquiring and rehabilitating the Cohoes Aquatic Center to provide no to low-cost swimming programs for the general public.

City of Hudson – (\$792,649) Waterfront Public Pool: The City of Hudson will construct a municipal public pool at the scenic Hudson River waterfront. The pool will be designed to be fully accessible to persons of limited mobility and adjacent to a concentration of public housing projects in the city.

Schenectady County – (\$10 Million) Capital Region Aquatic Center: SUNY Schenectady County Community College, Schenectady County and the Capital Region Aquatic Center will construct an 80,000 square foot, state-of-the-art aquatic facility with a regulation Olympic-sized pool and diving with seating for 1,200 spectators and on-deck seating for 600 athletes in downtown Schenectady. The location will provide greater access to aquatic programming for all ages and abilities, and become a community anchor for aquatic education, competition and workforce development efforts such as lifeguard certification.

City of Troy – (\$5,818,695) – Knickerbacker Park: The City of Troy will construct a new Knickerbacker Pool facility to replace the previous pool that closed in 2016. The new facility will be fully handicapped accessible and will include a 7,500 square foot primary pool, splashpad area, and a 3,800 square foot bathhouse.

Central New York Region - \$4 million

City of Syracuse - (\$2 million) Upper Onondaga Park Pool Improvement Project: focuses on updating the existing pool facility and the interior of the bathhouse which will enhance the functionality, safety and accessibility of the pool and bathhouse, ensuring they meet modern standards and better serve the community including a zero-entry access ramp for equitable user access.

City of Syracuse - (\$2 million) Thornden Park Pool: will be expanded to include 10 competition lanes, a separate 3-foot depth area designed for children, a new concrete pool deck, new shade structures, upgraded water service and drainage, new ladders and fencing, and an advanced sand filter system. Additionally, the project will include accessibility improvements including accessible ramps, handrails and ADA compliant changing facilities, enhanced with lighting for evening swimming and security.

Finger Lakes Region - \$1,394,800:

City of Rochester – (\$1,394,800) Lightfoot Park Construction Phase 1: The City of Rochester will implement the Lightfoot Park Master Plan including replacement of the aging outdoor pool with a new ADA accessible pool, splash pad and ADA accessible playground.

Long Island Region - \$9,990,280:

Village of Hempstead – (\$9,990,280) Kennedy Park Pool: The Village of Hempstead will implement a comprehensive renovation of the Kennedy Memorial Park Pool facilities including the replacement of the bathhouse, concession building, main pool and filtration system. The existing wading pool will be replaced with a spray pad and a new concrete deck, and new walkways will be installed to improve overall accessibility.

Mid-Hudson Region - \$38,152,425

Dutchess County – (\$10 million) Youth Opportunity Union Aquatic Center: Dutchess County will construct the Youth Opportunity Union Aquatic Center, comprised of an eight-lane lap pool, a two-lane family and therapy pool, and locker rooms. The Aquatic Center is part of a larger Youth Opportunity Union facility that includes space for after school programming.

Town of Hyde Park- (\$794,560) Hackett Hill Park Pool: The Town of Hyde Park will revitalize the municipal swimming pool, replacing the filtration system, pool shell, pool deck and adding new ladders and an ADA compliant walkway.

City of Kingston – (\$3,343,345) Kingston Point Beach Swimming Facilities: The City of Kingston will implement a design of multi-tiered raised terraces to connect upland areas on either side of the existing beach to provide flood mitigation and protect the interior of Kingston Point against sea level rise. The primary objective of the project is to promote resiliency through the protection and management of natural resources and sensitive ecosystems while protecting and reinforcing the shorelines.

City of Kingston – (\$180,000) Andretta Pool: The City of Kingston will renovate the Andretta Pool, replacing the pump and underground infrastructure and a lift to the pool as well as ADA-compliant steps, a splash pad feature and a shade structure at the complex.

Village of Millerton - (\$6,385,000) Millerton Community Swimming Pool: The Village of Millerton will construct a new outdoor swimming pool, community pool house and septic system at Eddie Collins Memorial Park.

Village of Monticello – (\$660,000) Dehoyas Park Pool: The Village of Monticello will construct a larger community swimming pool to increase bathing capacity to 300 people which will include ramps, handrails, and pool lifts to accommodate individuals with mobility challenges.

City of Newburgh – (\$8 million) Delano Hitch Aquatics Center: The City of Newburgh will construct a new aquatic center to replace the pool complex originally constructed in 1920, featuring a fully ADA accessible competition sized pool, new changing rooms and restrooms, new parking area, new concessions stand and a splash pad.

City of New Rochelle – (\$1 million) Lincoln Park Pool: The City of New Rochelle will make renovations to the Lincoln Park Pool including upgrades for the main pool and replacement of the existing wading pool.

Village of Spring Valley – (\$217,520) Memorial Park Pool: The Village of Spring Valley will undergo the rehabilitation of the Memorial Park Pool which will allow the Village to reopen the facility. The pool complex serves 33,000 people and is the only public pool in the Village.

Ulster County – (\$3,920,000) Ulster County Pool: The County will renovate the Ulster County Pool by replacing the pool deck, pool bottom and piping, and installing a new gutter system, adding zero-depth entry ramps and modifying the wading pool into a modern spray ground.

Town of Warwarsing – (\$3,652,000) Town of Warwarsing Community Pool: The Town of Wawarsing will reconstruct the community pool and bathhouse facilities to comply with current health and safety standards and ADA compliance.

Mohawk Valley awarded \$553,366:

Town of Sharon – (\$553,366) Town Community Pool Project: Originally constructed in 1965, the town will replace the current pool with a new pool, doubling the size. They plan to construct a shade pavilion and a new bath and pump house.

New York City Region \$ 46,100,000

New York City – (\$10 million) Van Cortlandt Park Pool Complex: The NYC Department of Parks & Recreation will reconstruct the entire pool complex at Van Cortlandt Park in the Bronx, including the pool tubs and decks, filtration system and pool facility buildings with an ADA compliant design.

New York City – (\$10 million) Averte East Aquatic Center: The NYC Department of Parks & Recreation will develop an aquatic center within the Arverne and Edgemere neighborhoods of Queens that will include an outdoor pool that is free and open to the public in the summer and an indoor pool accessible to the public through a NYC Parks recreation membership. The aquatic center will serve as a hub for recreation, fitness and aquatic related training.

New York City – (\$10 million) Hansborough Recreation Center Pool: The NYC Department of Parks & Recreation will renovate the Hansborough Pool, which

was originally opened in 1925 as well as the 134th Street Bath House. Upgrades will be made to the pool building interior and exterior, pool vessel, filtration system, elevator, and building boilers. Exterior work involves reconstructing and restoring the brick façades and parapet and providing for a new roof and large center skylight to allow the pool area to be illuminated with natural light during the day. The pool vessel will be competition-ready, long-lasting, and low-maintenance while preserving and reconstructing the historic mosaic and terracotta Guastavino tiles.

New York City – (\$10 million) Hamilton Fish Recreation Center Pool: This project will reconstruct the recreation center, outdoor terraces, pool, and pool filter plant at Hamilton Fish Park, located at 128 Pitt Street in the Lower East Side neighborhood of Manhattan. The architectural renovation will transform this historic site by bringing it up to today's safety and accessibility standards for the benefit of the community.

New York City – (\$6,100,000) Tompkins Square Park Mini Pool: The NYC Department of Parks & Recreation will reconstruct and expand the mini pool at Tompkins Square Park by removing the existing above ground mini pool and replacing it with an in-ground pool, which will double the current capacity. Additionally, they will replace the filtration system, expand the pool decks, replace the perimeter fencing and gates, add outdoor pool showers and a new lifeguard chair.

North Country Region \$2,508,000:

City of Ogdensburg – (\$2,508,000) Elsa M. Luksich Municipal Pool: The City of Ogdensburg will renovate the Elsa M. Luksich public pool and bathhouse complex, including replacing the pool surface, decking, filtration system and plumbing, making the facility accessible for individuals with disabilities, and modernizing the bathhouse.

Southern Tier \$1,610,151 million:

City of Binghamton – (\$231,412) Recreation Park Pool: The City of Binghamton will renovate the Recreation Park Pool which will include a full deck replacement, the relocation of admissions, the installation of drainage and regraded pathways as well as gated kiddie pool access and the installation of a picnic area.

Chemung County – (\$198,739) Harris Hill Pool: Chemung County will rehabilitate the Harris Hill Pool, including replacement of the pool liner.

Town of Cohocton – (\$680,000) Lawrence Parks Pool: The Town of Cohocton will replace the pool at Lawrence Parks with an ADA certified pool.

Village of Walton – (\$500,000) John "Jack" Kelly Pool Renovation Project: The Village of Walton is renovating the John "Jack" Kelly Memorial Pool including replacing the pool decking, piping, drainage components and the kiddie pool.

Western New York Region \$14,214,856:

City of Buffalo – (\$7,280,000) Houghton Pool Improvements: The City of Buffalo will demolish the existing Houghton Park pool, along with the nearby shelter house and garage, and replace it with a community pool which will be constructed with a zero-depth entry, lap lanes and fencing. Additional amenities will include a new splashpad with play features and safety surfacing.

City of Buffalo – (\$2,648,480) Riverside Pool: The City of Buffalo Riverside Park Pool project includes the replacement of the pool decking, filtration and regeneration system, and upgrading existing locker rooms for ADA access.

Town of Cheektowaga – (\$2,260,440) Cheektowaga Town Pool Beautification and Enhancement Project: The Cheektowaga Town Pool Beautification and Enhancement Project will include installation of new security fence, public safety cameras and access control, handicap accessibility including an ADA ramp, two new ADA lifts, a new filtration system, and other amenities.

City of Niagara Falls – (\$400,949) Center Court Public Pool: The City of Niagara Falls plans to renovate the Center Court Pool to include replacement of the pool lining, installation of new main drain covers and a new filtration system.

City of Olean – (\$704,988) Willian O. Smith Recreation Center Pool: The City of Olean will rehabilitate the Willian O. Smith Recreation Center Pool including replacement of the filter equipment and pumps, underground drains, fencing, rails and ladders, installation of a new concrete pool deck and an ADA portable lift.

Village of Westfield (\$920,000) Welch Field Pool: The Village of Westfield will renovate the Welch Field Pool, replacing the concrete deck and the pool house with a new ADA compliant facility, including ADA compliant showers, restrooms, and sinks.
