

The New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services will administer \$28 million to district attorneys' offices in New York City, and municipal police departments, sheriffs' offices, probation departments, district attorneys' offices, and service providers in 20 counties outside of the five boroughs, to improve the public safety response to intimate partner and domestic violence and better address needs of survivors.
